

Team "One Love" Hikes the Valley in honour of their **beloved Lynne Tracy**

St. Joseph's Villa and Margaret's Place Hospice are the cornerstones of the Villa Campus of Care. The compassionate care we deliver would not be possible without the incredible support of a caring community. Hike the Valley is one of our annual fundraising events that holds a special meaning for many.

This year, we are privileged to have the Tracy family joining us, hiking in memory of Lynne, beloved mother to Logan and Lucas, and wife to James, who passed away at Margaret's Place Hospice in October 2022. Lynne's journey with cancer was a difficult one, and her family found comfort in the care she received in hospice.

It was in 2016 when the Tracy family first learned of Lynne's cancer diagnosis. After a self-screening, Lynne noticed a lump that would later test positive for breast cancer. She began treatment immediately and by the following year, she was cleared. Lynne was cancer-free!

"We were ecstatic," says her husband, James. "We were so relieved to get that news and get back to the life we had always envisioned with our two young boys."

Life was back to normal for them for a few years, but in December 2021, Lynne's cancer came back, and this time, more aggressively. After over 20 rounds of radiation and one month spent in a hospital bed, there was little progress. As Lynne faced the prospect of spending her final days in the hospital, the Tracys felt it was time to explore hospice care options.

When James first toured Margaret's Place, Hospice at St. Joseph's Villa, he knew it was perfect for Lynne and his family. "It brought me so much hope," says James. "We no longer had to be confined to a shared hospital room. Margaret's Place was a space I knew Lynne would be comfortable in."

While moving to hospice care was a difficult decision given what it meant, it was one that significantly improved the quality of life Lynne and her family had left together.

"It was a blessing," says James. "We had a private room with plenty of space, natural light, our own back patio and gathering spaces where we could have friends and family. Lynne loved being able to be outside on the patio, with the sun on her face, watching our boys play outside. We even got to celebrate her 44th birthday with our loved ones in the Great Room on a beautiful, sunny day."

The Tracy family's experience with Margaret's Place inspired them to participate in the St. Joseph's Villa Foundation's inaugural Hike the Valley last year.

Their team was named "One Love", chosen by her best friend Antonija and inspired by the local musician who would sing to her at the hospice. The One Love team raised over \$6,400, making them the top fundraising team for the peer-to-peer fundraising event.



A RICH HISTORY OF COMPASSIONATE CARE



If you ask any resident of Dundas about St. Joseph's Villa or the House of Providence, you will hear a treasure trove of memories. My parents were residents; I was a volunteer; my first job; and so many more. One memory that will bring a smile to every face that mentions it is..."I remember the House of Providence Picnic!"

The cornerstone of the mission of St. Joseph's Villa was established in 1879 when our founders, the Sisters of St. Joseph of Hamilton, pioneers of Canada's healthcare system, opened the House of Providence to care for the elderly and the disadvantaged.

It's hard to believe that the compassionate care the Sisters began delivering to our community continues to be delivered 144 years later. When you think of the number of people who have received or have been touched by that care, we are talking millions.

144 years of constant care and a mission that remains as strong today as it was then. This mission of compassionate care has withstood two world wars, the great depression, multiple fires at the House of Providence, and the rebuild of our Campus of Care with St. Joseph's Villa as it stands today and the newly opened Margaret's Place Hospice.

Today, St. Joseph's Villa is home to 425 residents, 59 convalescent patients, an Adult Day Program that serves hundreds of clients in our community, as well as a community hub with many community clinics and services.

Everyday life at the Villa is just that...life. On any given day you will find Peter delivering the newspaper to staff, Kathy making her Avon sales, and Poet Glenn finishing off his latest poem. Nothing makes us feel as good as a trip to our hair salon that is busy cutting and setting hair daily. Our Cassaday Cafe is serving up breakfast, lunch and creating a gathering place for residents, families and staff to sit, relax and enjoy time together.

The first fundraiser held on our campus was in 1879, when the first House of Providence Picnic was held. It all started when Father McNulty purchased the House for a price of \$10,000, but he had a \$2,000 shortfall. The picnic was established to raise that amount. It went on for over 100 years before it came to an end during the redevelopment of St. Joseph's Villa in the early 2000's. We now look forward to bringing this honoured tradition back.
